COMPREHENSIVE CONSTRUCTION EDUCATION

- Members receive discounts with Lorman Education Services. Lorman Education Services provides cost-effective training opportunities that meet the needs, enhance the skills, restore knowledge, and build competencies of NAWIC members. This partnership provides a convenient way for NAWIC members to keep up with CEUs, as some classes are offered online or in cities around the country. Course topics include Problems and Risks Associated With Green Construction, Construction Project Accounting, Legal Implications of Environmental Contamination, Calculating the Cost of a Change and many more.
- The NAWIC Education Foundation (NEF) offers courses in the fundamentals of construction terminology, processes, procedures and technology that provide a strong, thorough overview of the industry. The following certification programs are offered through Clemson University: Certified Construction Associate (CCA), Construction Bookkeeping Technician (CBT), Construction Document Specialist (CDS) and Construction Industry Technician (CIT).
- NEF focuses on educating young people from kindergarten through 12th grade, with an emphasis on exposing children to construction career opportunities. More than 6,000 students each year participate in NEF's award-winning national Block-Kids contests, which promote construction education at the grade-school level. The CAD/Design/Drafting Scholarship Competitions are offered at the middle-school/junior-high and high-school levels.
- Each year, the NAWIC Founders' Scholarship Foundation awards \$50,000 in scholarships to students enrolled in higher education and skilled trades training programs.
- Many NAWIC chapters have established scholarships and financial awards for area students pursuing degrees in various fields of construction.

PROMOTING INDUSTRY AND COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

- Local NAWIC chapters initiate and participate in projects that benefit the industry and community, such as Habitat for Humanity and the Phoenix, Ariz., Chapter's Construction Dictionary, which is now in its ninth edition with more than 85,000 copies sold. - Chapter members have renovated schools, constructed homeless shelters and playgrounds, and taught construction safety workshops. Chapters and regions have united to create and participate in flood- and disaster-relief programs and have sponsored construction education classes.
- Numerous NAWIC chapters coordinate and participate in Mentoring a Girl in Construction (MAGIC) Summer Camps. MAGIC Summer Camp is designed to offer high-school girls opportunities to learn about the countless avenues of employment for women in the construction industry and to engage them via hands-on training.
- NAWIC members are involved in joint activities with area construction companies, civic organizations and other associations, creating a network of communication and support in their communities.
- NAWIC chapters conduct Career Days in local schools and communities to encourage boys, girls, men and women to enter the world of construction.
- Many chapters participate in job fairs to recruit women who are interested in changing careers and to provide information on educational and training requirements for both traditional and nontraditional construction opportunities.
